






the Back Page

Our club member Michael Chaplan uses his photographic skills in his other hobby. He is an accomplished adventurer, searcher-for and investigator of remote historical areas.

Read about Michael Chaplan's latest expedition in this "American Digger" article about his expedition to the "outback Caribbean" island of St. Vincent, to search for prehistoric rock carvings by the remote Conaree River, with the unplanned help of banana farmers. These petroglyphs were first revealed to the outside world by early 1900's British missionary Thomas Huckerby. It's an exciting adventure, which also includes climbing the island's active volcano, La Soufrière. Click here for a link to the article, illustrated with 10 photos.



I was getting directions from Dr. Earle Kirby, the Museum Director on St. Vincent, a West Indies island about 150 miles off the coast of Venezuela. My plan was to track down some petroglyphs first described by early 1900s Caribbean missionary Thomas Huckerby in his 1921 Indian Notes and Monographs article. The term "Carib stone" is local jargon for the prehistoric Amerindian rock carvings found on the island.

We were at the museum discussing the island's prehistory, which dates back at least 2,000 years. This small museum

is located in the Botanical Gardens, which was established in 1765 to grow different varieties of sugarcane, in case disease attacked the current crop. Breadfruit trees from Tahiti were brought here in 1793 by Captain Bligh of Mutiny on the Bounty fame. Our chat also included local obeah (voo-doo) practices, toxic tropical plants, bush medicine, and the island's desolate, colonial-era forts and plantations. Exploring 1770s Fort Charlotte with my metal detector for military relics was my primary reason for being there.

I was also shown some interesting artifacts, including a two-foot tall bat effigy pot stand (ca. AD 600), found in pieces near an old lava flow on La Soufrière, the island's smoldering volcano. This curious relic is thought to have been used in hallucinogen ceremonies where the imbibed substance was prepared on top in a clay pot, and then a fiery torch was put inside to produce thick smoke that billowed out of the eyes and from between the teeth of the bat's head. It looked like it was going to scream!

This discussion also brought a laugh, with Dr. Kirby suggesting, "Now, there's a challenge for you. Get up to the volcano and find some unknown Carib stones!"

"Could be," I replied, since during my pre-trip planning I had already began wondering if that was a viable quest for
